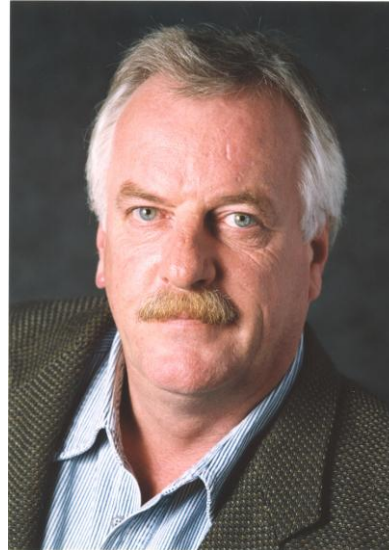


# Taking the side of our communities
