The Precautionary Principle and How It Applies To COVID-19 Part III - Summary Sheet

1. What is the Precautionary Principle and Why is it Important:

- It is a legal requirement under the OHS Regulations and the interpretive OHS Guidelines in BC.
- The highest level of safety (hazard and risk) controls should be used until there is definitive evidence that such controls are not required.
- Precautionary measures should be taken even if cause-and-effect relationships are not fully established scientifically.
- Adopt and implement provisional (interim) precautions covering all routes of transmission, based on a higher level of protection despite the identity, causation or routes of transmission of the biological agent have not been established.

3. How Does the Precautionary Principle Apply to COVID-19 Safety Plans (WorkSafeBC, Health Authority, Ministry, Employer, etc.):

- "WorkSafeBC requires employers to continually assess the risk of COVID-19 transmission at their workplaces and to apply controls to control that risk.
 The process for assessing risk in the workplace and selecting appropriate controls is outlined in the COVID-19 Safety Plan. Employers need to stay vigilant and ensure their COVID-19 Safety Plans are understood and being followed through effective training and supervision."
- Three key requirements arising from the bullet above are:
 - > Assessment of hazards and risks is ongoing and not a one-time event or process.
 - Controls of the hazards and risks must be continuously applied.
 - > Employers must stay vigilant.

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
