Seamless Childcare



What is Seamless Childcare?

Seamless childcare is a model of beforeand after-school care delivered inside public schools by trained support staff. These programs provide licensed care in familiar spaces where students already feel safe, supported, and connected.

Because pickup and drop-off happen in the same place every day, families face fewer disruptions and less stress. Kids stay in a familiar environment with adults they already know and trust.

This model is affordable, effective, and easy to scale. It's already working in school districts across BC, and it's ready to grow.



District-operated beforeand after-school care creates a seamless experience for children in a setting where they already feel secure. It reduces transitions, builds on existing relationships, and offers our dedicated CUPE support staff extra hours and professional growth. It's a win-win for students, families, and staff.

FOR FAMILIES

Less stress, more stability

One consistent location for pickup/drop-off

Affordable fees

Most of our Education Assistants (EAs) get less than 30 hours a week, so they need second or third jobs. When we started our childcare pilot, one EA told me the extra hours were life changing. It made her feel becoming an EA was the right choice. Offering this work so EAs can make a livable income is paramount to recruiting and retaining these invaluable staff.

In 2024, the BC government funded 3 school districts to pilot before- and after-school childcare, delivered in public schools and run by school support staff.

These programs are already demonstrating that school-based childcare is:

Using existing school spaces and staff

Affordable for families and viable for school districts, with provincial support

Nanaimo-Ladysmith (SD 68, CUPE 606)

- Grew from 2 to 10 sites in under 2 years
- Programs staffed by CUPE EAs in school classrooms, libraries and gyms
- Strong demand with growing waitlists, especially for after-school care

Real Result

Chilliwack (SD 33, CUPE 411)

- Expanding to 8 beforeand after-school sites
- Extra hours have stabilized work for many support staff
- Trusted school staff help students with diverse needs thrive in childcare

Having before- and after-school care delivered directly by school district staff has been a huge step forward. These programs need stable support so they can take root and truly meet the needs of our community.

Q: What will it cost families?

Affordability is a core benefit of seamless childcare. As part of the BC Coalition of Child Care Advocates' \$10aDay Plan, it's designed to make childcare more accessible and affordable. Fees vary by school district, but because seamless childcare uses existing public school spaces and qualified school staff, it costs less to deliver—savings that are passed on to families.

Q: Who delivers the care?

Seamless childcare extends the school day by integrating before- and after-school care into the public school system. Care is provided by existing school staff, typically an Education Assistant or Early Childhood Educator, under the supervision of local administrators who are ultimately accountable to elected school trustees.

Q: Why should childcare be delivered directly by school districts?

Parents trust public schools and the staff who work in them. District-delivered programs are accountable to elected trustees, staffed by qualified school employees, and focused on kids, not profit. That means more stability for families and stronger connections between schools and their communities.
